In this world, too much evil communication has been passed around, back and forth from heart to heart. It has produced too many fearful people (including innocent ones) that hide their shame and guard their heart, hiding behind an image. Communication is kept on the surface, only on safe subjects.

An image may infatuate us but it cannot communicate or feel for us.

In spite of all the pain we cause each other, few of us become hermits because to have no communication can be even more painful. God wants fellowship and honor, so He made us in His image; likewise, we want fellowship; we

want to be valued, honored, and needed. Our hearts will never be satisfied until we have it. We will try to secure it for ourselves. We manipulate, we obligate, we submit, and honor others—whatever it takes to keep them communicating with us—often under the guise of being helpful and right.

We organize and join groups. We want to belong, to fit in, be part of a cause. We make rules to form a collective image to hide behind. Our fear of each other serves to control and brainwash. We love to set rulers on a pedestal and let them be the responsible ones. We promote our image and may call it the church of Christ, Americans Against Religion, or whatever. Those who do not promote our image are demoted or driven away. It's all about trying to get fellowship and honor-and in the process others are trampled or forgotten. We do not know each other's hearts and wonder why there is strife and division.

How can you believe, you who receive honor from one another and do not seek the honor that comes from God only? John 5:44 MKJV

What is fellowship with an image or with those who make us want to run and hide? What is honor from those who don't know enough to rightly judge? God alone is all knowing, true, and trustworthy.

We need a change of heart. We have listened to the devil, the father of lies, and become his children. (John 8:43-44) Let us give our heart to Christ, the Truth, (John 14:6) and accept His sacrifice to reconcile us to our true Father. He will cleanse us and with His message of love,

truth, and mercy in our heart, we can pass it on to others.

If we think we have given Him all our heart and some evil still comes forth, there is a part of us that we must yet surrender. Evil treasures can enter deep into our hearts. Unable to handle them, we may close them off; consequently, we may not know what all is in our heart. Looking diligently lest any man fail of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, and thereby many be defiled; Hebrews 12:15

It may take a long time, but God will reveal to each listening soul the deep recesses of his heart. As each thing is brought to light, he can turn it over to Christ for cleansing, healing, and victory over sin—over offending and being offended and over the fear of others.

It is not easy to deal with evil communication or the wounds and scars of the past. By resting and abiding in Him we will find joy and strength. Counteract evil with love, patience, and Christ's prayer, Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do. Luke 23:34.

We can relax, be our self, and communicate honestly if we seek to glorify our Father and accept our selves for who we are and where we are. The one who has nothing to hide or pretend, is humble—and that is attractive no matter how simple minded or physically marred he may be. But one who hates himself and tries to be something he is not is pitiful or obnoxious, no matter how talented or physically attractive he may be.

Honest communication is worth the pain of accepting reality. Let God be true, but every man a liar; Rom 3:4. When we confess that God is true and confess our sins—that is honest communication.

We can learn from others. We may listen to their psychologies, philosophies, advice, directions, criticisms, and stories of how they got to where they are. But we must remember who we are and not get frustrated because we are not what they are or where they are. Compare what you hear and yourself with God's word. Be whom you are and go from where you are to where and what *God* wants you to be, under the authorities that *He* has set over you.

For we dare not make ourselves of the number, or compare ourselves with some that commend themselves: but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise. 2 Corinthians 10:12

We are complex people with complex problems, much of which involves some form of communication with complex people that have complex problems. Before there can be solutions, His Spirit must show us that we have a problem. We must know what it is. It is helpful if we know the root cause. We must know what is right and how to apply it to our situation. We must learn how to do what is right and get the power from God to do it. But if we make excuses, we will never reach that last step.

And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work: 2 Cor. 9:8

When we no longer feel threatened by what we are and

what others are, we can concentrate on the work in the most exciting and worthy cause of all, the Kingdom of God!

As we keep learning to know ourselves and keep receiving those good treasures from the heart of God, our communication will become more honest, real, open, and free. When our heart is honest, cleansed of its guilt and shame, we can reach out in service to other hearts. We will listen to their heartbeat and release them to be who they are. We must become a safe person, someone that others can trust to expose their heart to.

Our foremost need is heart-to -heart fellowship with God. When we forsake our agenda of trying to get for ourselves and instead give ourselves to Him and honor Him. we can be born of His Spirit. Then He can honor us with a changed heart that takes responsibility to be our brother's keeper. Then He can fellowship with us and will set us in His church as it pleases Him. (1 Cor. 12:18). We can benefit by the service and gifts that He ordains. It's all about giving fellowship and honor, first to God then to others. By being willing to stand-alone for Truth we gain the fellowship of true and good hearts

We need God to change our deceitful hearts, open our eyes and ears, and be what He made us to be. Then, with a heart full of joy, we can tell others that need genuine communication with Christ and His church, the wondrous things He has done for us. Let us listen closely to the Spirit of Truth and pass on those good treasures, around and around, back and forth, from heart to heart.

The church of Jesus Christ is the body of believers who have accepted the atonement of His blood for their sins. It is a living organism. It has organization, which is administered by the Spirit through servants born of the Spirit.

Man will religiously create, es-

tablish, erect, organize, and follow, imitate, submit, obey to fulfill his needs. But without the Light of Truth and the Life of the Spirit, he will stumble and fail.

ur boys grew and learned so very much this past summer. A great deal of our summer term was spent in the North Country. There we had many Agricultural Studies in God's wonderful world.

We learned about strawberry farming in depth: soil preferences, maturation, harvesting, storing, and marketing. Probably the very best part concerned consumption!

In the fields, we had guided lessons from experts in tomatoes, cucumbers, peas, beans, squash, onions, garlic, new potatoes, herbs, and flowers. I dare not continue the listing, because it is in danger of becoming a run-on sentence!

The boys also got hands on experiences with the incredible world of bees. Many times, a simple talk became an invaluable lesson. Other times, up close viewing left an indelible print. Best of all, the final product of bee farming must be the yummiest lesson!

Many other "critter" lessons abounded. Domestic dogs and cats were fun subjects about which to learn. Sheep are never baaaad to add to the curriculum! The horses were beautiful additions to God's syllabus. It was a treat to have the chance for the boys to learn about dairy farming,

both by hand and machine.

My next to oldest got hands-on mechanical training. Saw mill operating had beginning instructions. Even vehicles, which run on filtered fryer oil, got his study!

Wilderness survival lessons were interspersed throughout the summer. Plantain is ever so useful in calming insect stings. Citronella and Eucalyptus became my favorite perfume! Some lessons were taught, and others were caught! By the way, whatever did happen to the HUGE spider we studied in Luke and Rachel's outhouse???

Numerous other lessons were learned. Print shop and Bookmaking 101 was top on the list. Also included in our summer term were: haying, care of sourdough starter, pickle making, butter churning, cheese and yogurt making, Phys-Ed (swimming at the flow), bread making, and the privilege to partake in a barn raising!

Most of all, we had truly wonderful fellowship. I suppose this could be listed as "Social Studies." More importantly, I would call it the forming of heartwarming friendships. These "lessons" will truly, without a doubt, last a lifetime! ¤

Martins Whole Wheat Bread

Put in a large bowl:
4 Tbsp Yeast
4 Tbsp Salt
1/4 Cup Honey

3 1/2 Cup Very Warm Water

Then let set until yeast looks like foam on the top. About ten minutes.

Then add flour. Put three cups in first and mix well then add until you have enough mixed in that you can knead in the rest with your hands and not get them too messy. I like to put a little oil on my hands to help keep the dough from sticking. Knead until you have a nice soft dough that can be handled without sticking to your hands. Let rise until double.

Knead again and let rise one more time or make into three loaves. Place in greased pans and poke with a fork about five times. Let rise until about one inch above side of pan. Bake at about 350 or 400 degrees for ½ or ¾ hour. Enjoy.

This is my husband Daniel's favorite bread. It does not always turn out well but that is only when you forget to put something in while trying to tend to a one and two year old. They do like to help and we try to let them as much as possible. I like to grind my wheat right before I use it in this recipe because it is still warm from the grinding and feeds the yeast really nice. The last time I made this I had help from my two year old and he thought that since I poked it with a fork he could poke it with his finger and we had some funny looking bread.

Pesto Sauce

Last fall we discovered pesto sauce. Some of our boys were putting a roof on a house for an Italian neighbor. He said he would feed them a special meal like they never had before. They came home in the evening raving about how good his spaghetti with pesto sauce was and that they didn't get hungry or tired for the rest of the day!

So this summer Timothy grew lots of basil and parsley. The neighbor man came one Saturday morning with his food processor to teach him how to make his special recipe. He also gave us some packs of the best Italian spaghetti and Pecorino Romano cheese. We ate good that night!

I found this recipe in one of my cookbooks.

2 cloves garlic 1 ½ cups fresh basil ½ cup pine nuts ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese ¾ cup extra virgin olive oil

Using a large mortar and pestle pound garlic and basil to a rough paste. Add nuts and pound until nuts are ground. Transfer to a bowl. Gradually blend in cheese. Mixture will be thick. Slowly stir in oil. Toss with hot pasta. Cover and refrigerate up to one week. Or put in small containers and freeze immediately. A little goes far.

Variations: Substitute fresh parsley for ½ or all of the basil. Or use cilantro. Use almonds with the skins removed or walnuts in place of pine nuts or use a mixture.

I used my blender to grind it. Since we have cows but no olive trees, I made some using melted butter for the oil and homemade cheese for the Parmesan. I like it on potatoes, bread (good with tomatoes and cheese), and with other things. We are looking forward to lots of meals this winter with pesto and "basil butter" from our freezer. Hopefully, all that nutritional goodness will keep colds and flu to a minimum.
