Traffic Rules from the Book of Books

There are many books of traffic rules, but did you ever think of the Bible as being one?

It was a dangerous intersection. Three cars were involved. Had it not been for the cool headedness and consideration of one driver there would have been terrible tragedy. That driver was a Christian. Afterwards he remarked, "I guess the Lord must have been in the back seat and I took orders!"

The fact is that Christians *should* be the best drivers. Conduct on the highways as well as everywhere else is based on character. Character is based on morals. Morals are based on religion. As Goethe once put it, "There is no outward sign of true character that does not rest on moral foundation."

There are many books of traffic rules, but I have never seen one based on the Word of Life. Of course, the Bible was written long before automobiles were thought of.

Jehu is the only Bible character who might qualify as a modern traffic hazard. Though thousands of years have passed since this king of Israel drove like mad, we still say of speeders, "He drive's like Jehu." But Bible truth and Bible principle have a strange reference to man's doing regardless of the time in which he lives. Automobile traffic rules are no exception. Someone ought to compile a set of traffic rules from the Book of books. With this thought in mind I sat down with the Bible the other day and came up with the following Golden Traffic Rules.

History and use of Lettuce

The lettuce is so named from the Latin word Lac, on account of the milky juice yielded by it in abundance. Lettuce is considered very healthy, especially in the spring--there are some of the family natives of all the warm and temperate latitudes of the globe. The leading cabbaging kinds were originally introduced from Egypt; those of upright growth, from the Island of Cos-hence the name Cos Lettuce applied to all the sorts that approach that character... Some of the varieties of the plant have been extensively cultivated for opium preparations. The plant is allowed to shoot up, for such purposes, until just on the eve of flowering, when the top is cut off, in the afternoon. In thirty-six hours, a brown crust is found on the wounded part of the stem, which is carefully collected. The stem is again cut, and repeatedly, till the plant ceases to yield its milky substance.... Lettuce is undoubtedly the best of the salading vegetables; many varieties are cultivated in Europe, and not a few in this country, but several kinds grown there are not adapted to our high and dry temperatures... Fetticus, or Lambs' Lettuce, is a native of Europe, and cultivated as a spring salad, but in France they frequently dress it like spinach. It is so termed from its having been in repute as an early feed for lambs.

Joseph __

Does It Pay to Do Right?

Poor Joseph! Every time he did what was right, someone played a dirty trick on him. Do you sometimes wonder if it pays to do what is right? Perhaps Joseph's story will encourage you.

Jacob loved Joseph more than all his children (Genesis 37:3). Jacob no doubt saw in Joseph qualities lacking in his other sons and even in himself, for there was nothing of deceit or guile in Joseph. He was completely open and frank. He hid nothing from his father or his brothers. He told his dreams to his brothers; and so completely were hatred and treachery removed from his nature that he had no idea that his revelations would bring out such an adverse reaction from his brothers.

Joseph was also in complete submission to his father. Jacob asked Joseph to visit his brothers and inquire about their welfare while they were away from home tending sheep (Genesis 37:13). By this time, Joseph must have been aware of his brothers' hatred and he must have heard of their treacherous and ruthless treatment of Shechem. He could only expect harsh treatment if he went to them alone and unprotected. Yet he offered no word of complaint or fear to Jacob, but did as his father commanded. His brothers responded to his concern for their welfare by selling him as a slave to traders going to Egypt.

We have seen how Joseph's character contrasted with that of his brothers. His response to Potiphar's wife shows how his behavior contrasted with that of his half-sister, Dinah. She went out into the world of her own accord, seeking social contacts. He was thrust into Egypt (a type of the world) against his will. She ended up in the house of Shechem, disgraced. He went to prison an innocent man rather than yield to temptation. Joseph's ability to refuse to listen to Potiphar's wife's suggestions was sustained by his horror of sinning against God. He was a normal young man with normal desires and reactions; he was in a strange land and, no doubt, led a very lonely personal life. But he fled temptation and suffered in prison rather than against God. We have strength in ourselves to resist temptation of any kind. The Lord Jesus knows our problems; he intercedes for us and can help us. Let us dread sin so much that we flee dangerous situations before it becomes too late.

So again, Joseph did what was right and suffered for it. Joseph probably would not have escaped prison even if he had yielded. Potiphar's wife appears to have been a thoroughly treacherous woman and might have betrayed Joseph to her husband when she was tired of him. So, Joseph would still have had to endure punishment, only without the comfort of a clear conscience and the

For Or Against

Some time ago, I was reading in the book of Proverbs. Proverbs tells us what it is like to be wise; it also says a lot about how the fool and scorner will act. I said to myself, this is nice to know how these different classes of people are, but what makes them the way they are. Are they just born this way? I read over the book again and it dawned on me; the theme of Proverbs is to answer this question. How you respond to teaching, instruction, correction, and rebuke is the difference between being wise and being foolish.

It is absolutely impossible to learn anything at the moments that you are scorning something or somebody. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." You can either fear God and learn or you can scorn him and be a fool. Proverbs then goes on and talks of relationships to parents. Again, it is clear that he is saying, hear them and be wise, or scorn them, and the result will be foolishness. So, it goes with all of life.

Some time ago I heard a statement that I thought was worth pondering. The statement went something like this:

"Grass farmers hate grain farmers, and grain farmers hate grass farmers. Hospitals hate midwives, and midwives hate hospitals. Steeple church people hate house churches, and house churches hate steeple churches.

Chemical farmers hate organic farmers, and organic farmers hate chemical farmers.

Protestants hate Catholics, and Catholics hate Protestants.

Doctors hate herbalists, and herbalists hate doctors.

Homeschoolers hate public schools, and public schools hate homeschoolers."

The above statements are, of course, generalizations. I think the above statements would be more accurate if we would change the word hate to scorn. Read them again with the word hate changed to scorn:

"Grass farmers scorn grain farmers, and grain farmers scorn grass farmers. Hospitals scorn midwives, and midwives scorn hospitals. Steeple church people scorn house churches, and house churches scorn steeple churches.

Chemical farmers scorn organic farmers, and organic farmers scorn chemical farmers.

Protestants scorn Catholics, and Catholics scorn Protestants.

Doctors scorn herbalists, and herbalists scorn doctors.

Homeschoolers scorn public schools, and public schools scorn homeschoolers."

What do you think, brothers and sisters, why do we tend to respond like this? Let me share some of my thoughts on this.

A Guide on Distance

The first thing to remember about tailgating is, don't do it! The old rule to allow one car length distance per 10 M.P.H between you and the car in front is good for speeds to about 40 M.P.H. only. REMEMBER that a car moving at 68 M.P.H. travels 100 feet per second! (A sneeze closes your eyes for just that long- 100 feet). Furthermore, it takes ³/₄ of a second to take your foot from the gas to the brake pedal.

By remembering that 68 M.P.H.= 100

feet per second, it is easy to divide and obtain other facts, such as 34 M.P.H. = 50 feet per second. And it's interesting to note that only 17 M.P.H. = 25 feet per second... These facts should convince the smart driver that it pays to take an additional second and increase the chances of life and safety... DON'T TAILGATE!

respond when someone disagrees with you? Is it with scorn? A big thing that the world watches is how we respond in this area.

There are three drastically different worldviews that I observe that people have. The most common one I will call the "for or against" worldview. This view usually scorns the people and things that one disagrees with.

It causes one to take an absolute position on something that is not very clear and to use all sorts of strained arguments to try to prove it. Principles are violated that are true in this process. One tends to scorn anybody that thinks differently than he or she does; although, if one would stop and think, he would still have questions about his own opinion.

If you are of the "for or against" mindset, you will be quick to think of someone as being against you if they rebuke you or disagree with you. If they support some thought of yours, you will tend to think that they are against whomever you are against.


I see a second viewpoint that is also wrong. This is a reaction to the first view, and it says to never judge — just get along with everything. The problem with this is that you end up not being allowed to really say, "This is truth, God said so."

The third viewpoint takes a view that is a lot more broadminded. This view says, "I want to learn, and follow God's ways." This view allows you to say, "I have thought about these issues, this is what I believe, and this is why. I realize, however,

that I am a finite human, and I may not be seeing the whole picture; therefore, I am eager to hear what you have to say - I might learn something from you." This view has no place at all for scorning. You can have a strong opinion and be mature enough and secure enough that you can listen with respect to the other side of an issue — and do it in a relaxed way because you have complete confidence that truth will stand. You will be completely free to agree, or disagree, with a friend and have that completely separate from the acceptance and love of the friendship. A friendship that is built on this kind of relationship will last. It will also be very beneficial to the spiritual life of all those that are near it.

Are you willing to lay your ego and your pride down, and learn from your brothers? God is asking us to quit the scorning, and to learn wisdom from him, and from everything that he brings into our lives. God's ways are true and righteous altogether.
